Hope you are having a good year so far in 2021. Ours has already had some interesting occurrences.


Houston has a sub-tropical climate. It is typically balmy and humid all winter long. We have an occasional freeze or two. Last week we had some crazy



Board/Directors Meeting Minutes

The January 31, 2021 Board/Directors meeting (by phone) was called to order at 9:06pm EST. Present on the call were Lauren Liggett, Dan Liggett, Ed Eller, Harvey Powers, Anna Bliss, Steve Eller, Emily Cook, and Jerry Kendall. Christine Walker. Corrine Casper, and David Eller were unable to attend.

Harvey expressed a concern that the website should have someone able to serve as a backup to him as webmaster since he is not getting any younger. He mentioned that Dan Liggett (editor) has all the passwords and could probably carry on in such a case. If no one else is interested, he and Dan will sit down together during the Conference and go over some of the details. He had previously had a software issue surrounding the administration of the website that has since been resolved.

Steve gave an update on the EFA Family Conference plans for July 14-18,2021 at The Hinton Center in Hayesville, North Carolina (directly across Lake Chatuge from Hiawassee, Georgia). After some investigation, he determined a bus would be cost prohibitive for the traditional Friday tour day, but thought renting 2 to 3 vans should work. He has been working on the itinerary for that tour along with lunch. Potential sites include a trip to Helen with some possibility of visiting a nearby Casino and/or the Old Smyrna Cemetery (if the road is improved by then).

He wondered if the cost of lunch at the Dillard House should be part of the total tour cost or separate. Including the lunch cost with the tour cost (entry fees and transportation) was appealing, but, when Steve contacted the Dillard House to reserve the luncheon at 11:30am on Friday, July 16, they suggested individual payment for lunch, since a group lunch would have to guarantee a set number of people whether everyone shows up or not. Just so everyone knows, Georgia has no mask mandate at this time. The Dillard House does follow Health Department Guidelines. Servers wear masks and tables are cleaned and disinfected between each use.

Steve went on to say that the cost would be \$70 per night per room (15 available) in the Nadine P. Johnson Retreat House, where the meetings will be held. That will ensure the cost of the Retreat House is covered. Some of that may be refunded if all the rooms are booked. Unfortunately, the other cottages and cabins at The Hinton Center have all been booked for the dates of the EFA Conference, so the 15 rooms in the Johnson Retreat House appear to be the only on-site accommodations available. There may be some other options for any overflow, so please contact Steve with any questions. Here is a link to a Google search for nearby hotels.

Steve said he would be happy to take room requests by email (ellerpop1@yahoo.com) or by phone/text (706-318-7826) and he will respond with a room number that can be added to the Conference Registration form in the February Chronicles along with payment. That room number will not be locked in until payment has been made.

The Saturday evening banquet will be catered by The Hinton Center at the Johnson Retreat House and will be about \$25 per person.

A discussion ensued about having some meals together at the Johnson House. The second floor has a large kitchen and sitting area. Nearby restaurants are limited, so on-site meals may be preferred. Steve will need to know ahead of time who wishes to participate in joint breakfast so groceries can be purchased in advance. Steve is looking into the possibility of using a camera or web cam to transmit the meeting to a large TV screen on the second floor. This would help limit the number of people in the meeting room and limit the need for using the stairs.

Steve reported that people who want to come early (Mon-Tue), can do so by contacting the Hinton Center to make arrangements directly. The charge per night is \$45 for Monday and Tuesday. If your EFA room number is requested, moving will be unnecessary.

Ed and Steve reported that the Hinton Center has agreed that all deposits are refundable up to a month prior to the Conference in case the COVID outbreak forces postponement of the Conference in July. Any postponement or cancellation of the Conference will be decided on prior to and published in the May Eller Chronicles. If that happens, all moneys collected will be refunded in full, so addresses need to be correct on registration forms.

Dan mentioned that EFA By-Law changes that had been published in the November 2019 Chronicles should probably be reprinted in both the February and May 2021 Eller Chronicles so people have a chance to review the changes prior to the Member Meeting during the Conference in July. All agreed that should be done.

Some nominations have already been made for EFA officers, but it was decided to solicit nominations for officers and board members. Any nominations made will be reviewed by a nomination committee prior to the EFA Conference in July and presented to the membership at the Member Meeting held at the Conference. Nominations from the floor are allowed as well, but prior nomination is preferred. Send nominations to Ed Eller, Secretary/Treasurer (kermiteller38@gmail.com).

Harvey reported website statistics for 2020 of 49,604 unique users, 130,080 visits and 3,982,359 pages viewed.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:36pm EST.

Proposed By-Laws Changes

At the November 17, 2019 Board/Directors meeting, a review of the Eller Family Association By-Laws was performed. The last time it was reviewed and amended was in 2007 (published in the <u>August 2007 Chronicles</u>, p. 44-47). These proposed changes were published with the Board Meeting minutes in the November 2019 Chronicles.

The following proposed amendments were agreed upon (old verbiage crossed out and new verbiage underlined) and will be discussed and voted upon at the next Members Meeting (EFA Conference):

Article IV, paragraph 1:

Annual dues shall be set by the Board of Directors and shall be for the fiscal year ending June 30 due on the anniversary date of joining the EFA. Membership dues shall include four quarterly issues of the ELLER CHRONICLES. Dues of persons joining during the year shall be prorated to the nearest quarter. Back issues of THE ELLER CHRONICLES shall be made available to members and non-members at a cost set by the Board of Directors.

Article V, paragraph 2b:

2b. A quorum shall consist of <u>30</u> members, including at least three members of the Board of Directors.

Article VI, paragraphs 5a, 5c:

- 5a. The President shall:
 - 5) Publish an annual report to the membership in the February issue of THE ELLER CHRONICLES.
 - 6) Submit a proposed annual budget to the Board of Directors for approval by January 1, a copy to be published in February issue of THE ELLER CHRONICLES.
- 5c. The Secretary/Treasurer shall:
 - 2) Maintain a current roster of the membership of the EFA and provide mailing labels to the printer of THE ELLER CHRONICLES.
 - 6) Make annual financial reports to the EFA membership in THE ELLER CHRONICLES, February August issue , which immediately follows the end of the fiscal year (July 31).

Article VII, paragraphs 1, 3a, 4:

- 1. The officers, elected or appointed directors, and the Editor of THE ELLER CHRONICLES and the EFA Webmaster shall constitute the Board of Directors.
- 3a. Meet once a year quarterly by phone , if feasible, or and every other year in person in conjunction with the general meeting.
- A quorum of the Board shall consist of four Board members including at least one officer.
 Notice Minutes of all Board meetings shall be published in THE ELLER CHRONICLES. Board meetings shall be open to all members of EFA.

Article IX

Amendments to the By-Laws may be proposed by the Board at a general meeting for approval by the membership. Provisional amendments to the By-Laws may be agreed upon and deemed "in effect" by the Board of Directors in an official Board meeting, but they will not be made a permanent amendment until voted on by the membership at the next bi-annual EFA Member meeting.

Article X

Upon the dissolution of THE ELLER FAMILY ASSOCIATION and/or the final completion of its business affairs, the remaining assets of the Association shall be distributed to one of the following:

- 1. The National Genealogical Society
- 2. An organization engaged in research of the Germanic migration to the United States, such as THE AUGUSTAN SOCIETY, INC. If possible, the stipulation to use those funds for researching the migration of ELLERS to the United States.
- 3. The upkeep of the ELLER FAMILY ASSOCIATION ARCHIVES, located at the Rowan County Library, Salisbury, North Carolina.

No specific changes to Article X, but the Board would like to visit this topic at the next Membership meeting in 2021 to come up with more specific guidelines.



Lake Chatuge, nestled in the Blue Ridge Mountains between Hayesville, NC on the north and Hiawassee, GA on the south, was created by the Tennessee Valley Authority in 1942 when a 2,950-foot earth-filled dam was built across the Hiawassee River. Below is a history of the lake from a blog posted by Brenda Kay Ledford, a seventh generation native of Clay County, NC.



History of Lake Chatuge

Chatuge Dam is an earth-fill type dam across the Hiawassee River about three miles southeast of Hayesville, NC. At full

pool elevation, water covers about 3,700 acres in Towns County, GA.

There was much speculation on June 12, 1941 that a dam was coming to this area. Clay County would be greatly affected by the TVA purchasing one third of the best farm land. Folks feared that many people would have to leave the county making the taxes higher.

According to historian Jerry Taylor, the TVA even worked on Sunday. "Back then folks stopped on Sunday since they attended church," he said. "But the TVA kept working on the storage dam at the mouth of Shooting Creek in Clay County."

Engineers hoped to have the dam finished in 15 months. Almost 2,000 skilled and unskilled employees would be needed to work nonstop on three shifts. Federal experts started looking into land acquisition. The dam in this area was called Chatuge that is believed to mean "the meeting of the waters."

Time is marching on. The House of Representatives passed a bill to build four dams in the Tennessee River area. The Senate gave final approval for the project July 10, 1941.

Besides beginning construction on Chatuge Dam, reunions and revivals were being held in July. About 2,000 Ledfords attended their final reunion and singing in the Scrougetown. Ledford's Chapel was moved to accommodate the dam. My parents, Rondy and Blanche L. Ledford, attended this last reunion before the church was forced to move for the dam.

A regional newspaper ran a feature on August 31, 1941 about the TVA forcing 500 families to move from Shooting Creek. The people were required to relocate by the last day of December, 1941. The prices for the land were still unclear.

Taylor said people thought the dam was needed to help our country win the war. "It was like a lamb to the slaughter," he added. "People did what they had to do."

How did people react to severing their roots? Some were philosophical, others downcast. Some were stubborn and had to be evicted. Most didn't know where they would move. Neighboring counties hiked land prices because farms were needed.

Allen Bell, superintendent of Clay County Schools, didn't know what to do about Elf School. About 283 students attended and most of the families would move. A new road must be built to reach the school. Water would surround the school and students didn't need a lake for their playground.

Holt Patton of Hayesville was worried about losing his land. He figured he would sit on the back seat when the TVA settled up. Patton said he could move his house, but wouldn't have land to make a living. "I'm in a plight," he added.

Hayesville swelled to capacity during the construction of Chatuge Dam. It was a booming town. Construction workers rented rooms out of houses. Citizens complained because of wide differences in land appraisals and there was no choice to sell your land. The TVA took all your land.

People scrambled to move before the December deadline. Some didn't make it. A local paper stated on January 9, 1942 that some old-fashioned neighborliness was needed to help people move. The TVA was burning barns, destroying homes, cutting trees, and clearing the land.

Even the wildlife scampered when their habitats were destroyed. The land looked like a hurricane had struck. A chimney stood where a family once lived. A lone chicken looked for a roosting place. Roads were torn up and muddy. Banks were bare. Water would soon cover the once rich farmland.

The local Lions Club started stocking fish in Lake Chatuge on May 22, 1942. The TVA project was finished.

Hinton Rural Life Center began in 1957 with a vision, a building, and 4.5 acres of land in Hayesville, a small town in the mountains of Western North Carolina. The Center came into being as the result of a gift of property from J. Walter and Velma Moore of Hayesville; a financial gift from Alice Lanier Hinton in memory of her late husband, Harold H. Hinton, of Athens, Georgia; and donations of money, materials, and labor from individuals and churches interested in the development of a rural life center, under the auspices of the Methodist Church.



Today . . .

In 2021, Hinton Rural Life Center celebrates its 60th anniversary! Still offering scenic views of Lake Chatuge and the beautiful Appalachian Mountains, Hinton's campus consists of over 15 facilities on 33 acres of property. Our lodging options include Hermitage cabins, Lodge rooms, retreat houses, and RV sites. Conference offerings include large and small meeting spaces and dining

rooms, an executive chef, and fiber optic internet connections. There are also indoor and outdoor worship areas, including a labyrinth, as well as trails, disc golf course, fire pits, and a dock for boating, swimming, and fishing.

In addition to offering space and place for individuals, families, and groups to gather, meet, and retreat, Hinton continues to "walk alongside" our neighbors in this rural mountain community through a variety of ministries, including Safe and Healthy Home

From the North (Asheville, Waynesville/Lake Junaluska):

[Travel time from Waynesville/Lake Junaluska is about 1 1/2 hours]

- * Follow I-40 (East or West) to exit 27(signs will indicate 74W, to 19, to 23, and to Waynesville)
- * Follow US 23 South/74 West towards Waynesville (stay in left two lanes)
- * Continue on through the Waynesville exits (you will pass a rest area on your left) and Sylva exits
- * Take exit 81 (sign will indicate Dillsboro, Franklin, Atlanta) and follow 23 South (also 441S and 64W)
- * Go through stop light in Dillsboro and continue 16 miles to Franklin (you'll pass "Gold City" on right)
- * In Franklin you will go through 4 stop lights, but do not leave highway; the road will become US 64 West in Franklin
- * Follow US 64 West over the mountains (about 32 miles) towards Hayesville
- * Turn left at Hinton Center Road (If you pass through a stop light, you have missed Hinton Center Road watch for large Hinton Center sign on the left)
- * Go straight at the stop sign (Oak Forest UMC on right); road ends in Hinton's parking lot

From the South (Atlanta, Hartsfield International Airport):

[Travel time from airport 2 1/2 to 3 hours depending on traffic]

- * Follow I-75 North through downtown (or follow 285 around Atlanta and take exit 14 onto I-75 N)
- * Go about 9.5 miles and take exit #268 onto I-575 North towards Canton and Woodstock
- * Follow I-575 through Marietta, Woodstock, and Canton
- * I-575 will turn into GA 515 North (Zell Miller Mountain Parkway)
- * Follow 515N through Jasper, Ellijay, Blue Ridge, Blairsville, and Young Harris (there are no turns during this time)
- * About 3.3 miles past Young Harris, turn left at the first light (GA 17/515)
- * Go 4.5 miles (you will cross the NC state line and the road becomes NC 69) and turn right at the first stop light, which

is US 64 E bypass

- * Go about 1 more mile (you will pass through another stop light and over a bridge)
- * At the 3rd street on the right past the bridge, turn right onto Hinton Center Road (watch for large Hinton Center sign on right)
- * Go straight at the stop sign (Oak Forest UMC on right); road ends in Hinton's parking lot

From Chattanooga:


[Travel time from Chattanooga is about 2 hours]

- * Follow I-75 North to the Highway 64 Bypass just south of Cleveland
- * Follow 64 Bypass around Cleveland and take 64 East as it exits toward Ocoee and Copperhill, TN (you'll go through the Ocoee River gorge)
- * Continue on 64E to Murphy, NC
- * Turn right at second stop light in Murphy just across bridge and follow 64 East toward Hayesville
- * Go about 14 miles to the first traffic light in Hayesville (do not turn at Hayesville Business sign)
- * Continue straight at the stop light for about one more mile (through another stop light, over bridge)
- * At the 3rd street on the right past the bridge, turn right onto Hinton Center Road (watch for large Hinton Center sign on right)
- * Go straight through the stop sign (Oak Forest UMC on right); road ends in Hinton's parking lot

From Western SC (Anderson area):

[Travel time from Anderson is about 2 hours]

- * Follow US 76 west through Clemson, Seneca, Westminster, and Clayton to Hiawassee, GA
- * Turn right onto GA 75 at traffic light at McDonald's in Hiawassee
- * Follow that road about 9 miles (it becomes NC175), turning left just over a bridge as indicated, toward US 64
- * At US 64, turn left toward Hayesville
- * After another 2-3 miles, turn left at Hinton Center Road (If you pass through a stop light, you have missed Hinton Center Road watch for large Hinton Center sign on the left)
- * Go straight at the stop sign (Oak Forest UMC on right); road ends in Hinton's parking lot.

NO HELP IN SIGHT

Pleasant Hill Teacher 'Fills In' Since 1917

\$45 Per Month Is Top Pay for Professor Who, at 75, Still Is Imparting Knowledge

This is another of a series of articles by a Journal staff writer exploring reasons why Georgia's educational system needs 7,000 certified teachers to bring its faculties up to par.

HIAWASSEE, Ga., Jan. 12.—When gaunt, gangling, knee-booted Professor Alfred M. Eller, the septuagenarian one-man faculty of muddy Pleasant Hill's rickety little schoolhouse, tells you he came back from retirement "just to help out during the war emergency," you incline to wonder facetiously to yourself, "which war?"

Then he tells you parenthetically he means the first World War, and you recognize a twinkle in the old gentleman's squirrelshooting eye.

Truth is, the professor doesn't want to keep school. Fact of the business, he quit once, "and stayed quit nigh onto 20 years," But here lately—since 1917—
they have been having trouble getting teachers for the little oneroom, seven-grade institutions of
elementary learning up in the
Blue Ridge, and here and there
he has been sort of helping out
"til things get back to normal."

Indeed, if it hadn't been for the professor there just wouldn't have been any school this year or last in the muddy little plank building on the bank of Big John Creek.

Straight as a Pine

Alfred M. Eller has seen 75 mountain winters, but is straight as a mountain pine. He knows his mathematics and geography and technical grammar backward and forward, says County School Superintendent Ray Nicholson, but because he got his education the hard way back when "credits" as such were unknown in these teacher's cerumicate.

So be makes \$45 a month.

For \$45 a month the professor trudges through the mud and the know and sometimes the warm sunny weather from his farm to the bare little building under Eagle Mountain five days a week to instill learning and a thirst for learning in 14 mountain children scattered through seven grades.

rie gets there and finds the one room cold, and he kindles a fire in the pot-bellied stove from the wood he himself has chopped and toted in and piled in a corner.

And he thinks it is taking them a long time to hunt up a regular state-certificate teacher for Pleasant Hill.

Professor Eller wants out. He wants to get back to his farm. He could make more money hoeing corn or shooting aquirrels or even digging snake root than the school teaching business pays a noncertificate instructor.

"Tain't the Same"

Mr. Nicholson says time was when he could get enough certificate iteachers, even for remote places like Pleasant Hill, but he can't get them now on the money he's provided for salaries. There just aren't enough college-educated people who'll work for \$85 now. Not while rabbits are bringing 25 cents apiece and pants factories are paying twenty-five dollars a week for only semi-skilled workers who don't have to have college educations.

So it looks like the professor is stuck with it for quite a spell yet. The old gentleman peered down over his bifocals at his charges—

some of whom walk only four mountain-miles to and from school every day—and mused:

cation. When I was comin' up I had to work for mine—cut tim-ber, work in sawmills of an afternoon and such. These children might not have it as good as some, but they have it pretty easy, and I reckon we've come a long way since the old days."

I told him I redkoned so.





James Hook printed the first work on the Eller genealogy in 1925 titled: James Hook and Virginia Eller. Strong evidence showing George Michael to the son of Georg Eller of Kaltenbrunn, Untermerzbach, Bavaria exists, showing George as the second son of the union of Georg and Margaretha Huels Eller.

Margaretha Eleonor Sallén began researching the Eller lineage in 1966 until her death in 1973 when it continued with David until completed and printed in late 2012. Each chapter focuses on nine generations of these figureheads: George Michael Eller, James Scott, John Martin, Sr., William Gallaway, Robert Harper, Sr., William Smith Bryan, and John R. Stewart.
