

From the Webmaster . . . Harvey Powers

Details of our July 2023 Biennial Conference are coming together. The conference will be held in Salem, Virginia (Near Roanoke) July 19-23.

We chose Roanoke to hopefully extend interest to the "Roanoke Botetourt Eller Branch." Jacob Eller and his wife Magdalene settled on "Wolf Run" in what is now Roanoke County (created from Botetourt in 1838) about 1790. The "Eller Homeplace" was sold to Jacob Eller in 1799 and was located about

seven miles southwest of Salem on "the headwaters of Craven Creek."

There is debate as to whether this Jacob Eller was himself an immigrant from Germany or if he is a descendant of George Michael Eller. We know there is a DNA connection between the two but there is also evidence that supports Jacob as an immigrant. Perhaps we'll find out more at the conference.

Our conference hotel is the Comfort Suites, 2898 Keagy Road, Salem, VA. Rooms are reserved for those attending the conference at the special rate of \$99 plus tax. There is a free breakfast available at the hotel each morning. Please make your reservations as soon as possible.

The hotel will be the location for our meeting room. In addition to EFA business, we expect to have presentations on (1) an update of the John Jacob Eller book, (2) a new Christian Eller book and (3) more on the Roanoke-Botetourt Eller branch. We are seeking others who may

want to present information.

We have booked a special excursion for Friday. We have arranged a bus to take our group up the famous Blue Ridge Parkway with a stop at the "Great Valley Overlook." The great valley seems to stretch forever. It is an opportunity to imagine how it must have looked to our ancestors as they headed west.



The bus excursion will take us to lunch at the "Peaks of Otter." The "Lake View Restaurant" has a menu featuring fresh and organic local ingredients and regional specialties. We will be able to order from a special lunch menu. Our bus will return us to the conference hotel in mid-afternoon.

Our Saturday night banquet will be near the hotel at Jersey Lily's Roadhouse, a well-known steakhouse in the area (dinners other that steak will be available).

A sign-up form for the conference is located in this issue of the *Chronicles*. If you are planning to attend, please sign up early as it helps us determine bus-size and the number of meals the restaurant can expect.

From the Editor . . . Dan Liggett

The Eller Family Conference in July will be the 18th Biennial Conference. Which began in Salisbury, NC in 1989. It is also the 35th anniversary of the Eller Family Association. What a rich history we have. Why don't you join us in July.

When webmaster Harvey Powers mentioned in his letter about the location of the "Eller Homeplace" of Jacob Eller, it sparked my curiosity. I just wondered if we could find the area in present day Roanoke County, VA. I found his location hints detailed further in the first few paragraphs of an article in The Eller Chronicles originally published in November 1991 and reprinted just last November 2022, but I never really took a hard look at the details in The Jacob Eller Plantation by John Clinton Eller (great-great-grandson of Jacob Eller). After just a



few minutes searching online, I found the <u>map</u> on the front page of this edition of The Eller Chronicles, also found on the EFA website under Media > Maps. I went on to put together a discussion of the map and some specific notations there in the article entitled Jacob Eller in the Roanoke County Area found later in this edition of The Eller Chronicles.

The Jacob Eller line has been front and center in the EFA since the early days. I found this announcement in the very first edition of the Eller Chronicles (Nov 1987):

REUNION: Descendants of Jacob and Magdalena Eller, who settled in the Roanoke VA Valley will hold a reunion in August 1990. Watch for further details in upcoming NEWSLETTERS. Contact Lowell and Sarah Eller, 678 Diamond Rd., Salem, Va

How fitting that we are finally holding a conference in that area. But we need everyone's help finding local Eller descendants to share their stories, pictures and history with us. If you have any contacts in the Roanoke County area, please invite them to the Conference.

Have an idea for something you would like to see in the Chronicles? Pass it on to me or, better yet, why don't you write one yourself for the next Chronicles. I'm always looking for material.

Board/Directors Meeting Minutes

The January 29, 2023 Board/Directors meeting (by phone) was called to order by president Steve Eller at 9:05pm EST. Present on the call were Steve Eller, Harvey Powers, Jerry Kendall, Lauren Liggett, Dan Liggett, Anna Bliss, Corrine Casper, Emily Cook and Ed Eller. David Eller was unable to attend.

Dan had sent out a preliminary Conference Registration form prior to the meeting which had several items highlighted for discussion, so Steve asked Dan to walk through those items.

- 1. Registration fee: After discussion, it was decided to set the registration fee at \$10 with a \$20 family maximum (children under 18 are free).
- 2. T-Shirt pre-orders: Sizes listed were Child M/L and Adult S/M/L/XL/2X/3X. After discussion, it was decided that the price would probably be set at \$10 for most sizes, but may be more for 2X/3X depending on what the actual prices are quoted to Ed when he calls the vendor later this week. Prices may have increased, so once Ed reports to Dan, they are authorized to set the prices either across all sizes or for some individual prices. This will happen in time to reflect in the February Chronicles.
- 3. Bus tour & lunch: After discussion, it was decided to keep bus trip cost separate from the lunch costs, so the bus trip price was set to \$25 per person (the difference to be subsidized by the EFA). Unless Harvey can arrange a buffet (restaurant is closed for the winter) before the February Chronicles, lunch costs will be up to the individual to pay at Peaks of Otter (https://www.peaksofotter.com/dine).
- 4. Banquet: Since Jersey Lily's Roadhouse (http://www.jerseylilys.com/) does not normally offer a buffet, after extensive discussion, it was tentatively decided to only ask how many would be attending the banquet and everyone would order off the menu and pay for themselves. Since Ed plans to go through Roanoke/Salem in mid-February, he will try to meet with the manager of Jersey Lily's (Preston Long) and see if a buffet might be possible. If a buffet is arranged, its cost will be added to the registration form. If that happens, Ed and Dan are authorized to set the price in time for the February Chronicles.

Ed has called Ellers in the Roanoke area, but has had little response. Harvey saw similar results. Steve had a contact there that he will call again and see if he can drum up interest. We need to get local interest started.

Steve reported that the John Jacob Eller book update project is nearing completion with just short of 30,000 names. Anyone wanting to contribute needs to get their info in ASAP. He also mentioned the need for discussion at the Conference about how to publish the book.

Steve also mentioned that the next step for the Old Smyrna Cemetery is for Towns County and the Forrest Service to work together to survey the cemetery area to establish official boundaries. The fund has the money to fix the road into the Cemetery, so he hopes to dedicate the new markers for Jacob L. Eller and Hardy Washington Eller sometime in the spring. It has been in the works for about 3 years now.

Lauren reported that Howard Eller of Kokimo, IN has agreed to present at the Conference. Howard will discuss his DNA experience and how he connects to Jacob Eller (Roanoke). As a descendant of Jacob Eller of Roanoke, VA, his DNA indicated he was connected somehow to the George Michael Eller line. While the actual family tree connection has not been found, it is there somewhere waiting to be discovered. Ed pointed out that Hook had claimed that Jacob Eller was George Michael Eller's son, but that is unproven. They certainly seem to be connected somehow, unless Howard has a different connection to George Michael Eller other than through Jacob Eller. Difficult to know without further research.

Since the last meeting, 6 new members, 8 renewals (1 Lifetime) and 1 Gift membership.

The meeting adjourned at 9:41pm EST.

<u>Update</u>: Since buffets were not available, the Peaks of Otter lunch (from a <u>limited menu</u>) and the banquet at Jersey Lily's Roadhouse will remain as ordered and paid individually. The t-shirts will be priced at \$12 and \$15 (2X/3X).

Proposed EFA By-Laws Addition

to be voted on at the General Meeting at the July Conference

In the May 2022 EFA Board/Director's meeting a motion was made, seconded and passed to amend the EFA By-Laws by adding paragraph 7 to Article VI (Officers), Section 5c of the EFA By-Laws that continues the statement "The Secretary/Treasurer shall":

7) Make an annual online report to the IRS (Form 990-N) to maintain tax exempt status of the EFA. This report must be completed between August 1 and December 1. The only information reported is the EFA's EIN number and whether gross receipts exceeded \$50,000. Also, a new Change of Address or Responsible Party — Business (Form 8822-B) shall be filed with the IRS when the Secretary/Treasurer office holder changes.

This was added because the EFA unknowingly let its 501(c)7 tax-exempt status lapse by not reporting to the IRS some years back. This was corrected in 2022 and we have been re-instated, but thought it best to put the need into the By-Laws so future Secretary/Treasurers are aware of their responsibilities. A side note, 501(c)7 is a tax-exempt status for a non-profit organization, but donations are NOT tax deductible. It does mean the EFA does not have to file or pay income tax as long as these reports are kept current.

Article IX (Amendments) states:

Provisional amendments to the By-Laws may be agreed upon and deemed "in effect" by the Board of Directors in an official Board meeting, but they will not be made a permanent amendment until voted on by the membership at the next bi-annual EFA Member meeting.

So, there will be vote on this at the EFA Member meeting at the July 2023 EFA Conference.

Jacob Eller in Roanoke County

The article entitled <u>The Jacob Eller Plantation</u> by <u>John Clinton Eller</u> (great-great-grandson of <u>Jacob Eller</u>) was originally printed in the <u>November 1991</u> Chronicles and reprinted in the <u>November 2022</u> Chronicles. The article contained surprising helpful details IF a map of the area was available, which was recently discovered at: https://dc.etsu.edu/rare-maps/160/



Notice the following details from the article that can be seen on this 1802 map:

- On February 9, 1802 he bought 400 acres of land in what was then Botetourt County,
 Virginia from Jacob and Elizabeth Yest. [on the map as Jacob Yost]
- This land was located in the beautiful Roanoke section of the Valley of Virginia in what
 was then Botetourt County in the Cave Spring District on Cravens Creek, five miles
 south of Salem Virginia.
- Much of his farm was on the foot hills of Sugar Loaf and Long Ridge Mountains.

Look on the next page at the zoomed section of the 1802 map Jacob Yost, Cravens Creek and Sugar Loaf Mountain. This <u>1802 map</u> complements the first few paragraphs of John C. Eller's descriptions following the map itself.



Growing up on what Jacob Eller called his Plantation was like living and walking through history. Here is where Jacob built his first cabin. This is where they got water out of the creek to wash their clothes. This is where they grew tobacco before grandpa quit. These are Albemarle Pippin apple trees that grandpa planted. This is why they are so big your arm can't reach around them. There is where great grandmother Polly's cabin was. She lived ninety-four years. My father- Christian Emory Eller seemed to know the answer to all my questions.

Jacob Eller immigrated from Germany to what was then Botetourt County Virginia along with many of his fellow countryman in the later part of the 1700. The earliest known date of his presence was when he was given a Grant of 150 acres of land by Governor Beverley Randolph on Wolf Run of Back Creek, a branch of Roanoke River, July 19, 1790. He later sold this land to John Brubaker.

On February 9, 1802 he bought 400 acres of land in what was then Botetourt County, Virginia from Jacob and Elizabeth Yest (Yeast) for \$1066.67.

This land was located in the beautiful Roanoke section of the Valley of Virginia in what was then Botetourt County in the Cave Spring District on Cravens Creek, five miles south of Salem, Virginia. He chose land on the Blue Ridge Mountain side of the Valley.

Much of his farm was on the foot hills of Sugar Loaf and Long Ridge Mountains. There were two streams on the farm. One on the western section, Cravens Creek, and one on the eastern section, Seacat Branch at the foot of Sugar Loaf Mountain. He later bought from Jacob Statler 49 acres of land. Much of the land was covered with timber. Later a road was built and he was appointed "Overseer of the Roads".

The <u>modern day map of the same area</u> below suggests that the Jacob Eller homestead would have been somewhere near red X on the map. It also appears the Cravens Creek has been renamed Barnhardt Creek (Barnhardt people appear in Jacob Eller's tree), but there is still a Cravens Creek Road nearby. [FYI, the Conference hotel (Comfort Suites Inn) is on Keagy Rd.]

Later in John C. Eller's article, he mentioned his grandfather, John W. Eller was the owner.

By this time much of the land had been cleared of timber. He planted extensive apple orchards including much of the land on Sugar Loaf Mountain. Other crops included wheat, corn, and tobacco. He later discontinued raising tobacco because he decided using it was a sin.

Although he remained a farmer through his life, John W. Eller had other interests. He was ordained by his church, the German Baptist Brethren, later changed to The Church of the Brethren, and was much in demand as a preacher and evangelist.

The Census Records of 1830, 1840, 1850, and 1860 have no reference to slaves being owned by the Ellers of Roanoke County. Also, Jacob Eller's descendants were members of the German Baptist Brethren Church which forbid the owning of slaves.

By 1906, <u>Christian E. Eller</u> had inherited the land from his father <u>John W. Eller</u> and that year he bought the land on top of Sugar Loaf Mountain and a right-of-way south to the <u>Sugar Loaf Mountain</u> Road from the Leighton family. Sometime later he



cleared the land on the south side of the mountain and planted a peach orchard.

This was also the year he gave the land to the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church. The land was deeded to this congregation of black members as long as it was used for a church.

The article entitled <u>The Sugar Loaf Kids</u> by <u>Edna Francis Eller Snavely</u>, printed originally in the <u>Feb 1990</u> Chronicles (reprinted <u>Nov 2022</u>), mentioned the location of the homestead.

After the marriage they [Christian and Rebecca Eller] began their home five miles south of Salem, Virginia at the foot of Sugar Loaf Mountain, in the home of John W. and Hannah Brubaker Eller.


Also mentioned in The Sugar Loaf Kids article was the Oak Grove Church of the Brethren.

Five of the Eller boys were licensed and installed as ministers in our home church. 'This was the Oak Grove Church of the Brethren, Salem, Virginia. Three of the five graduated from Bethany Seminary in Chicago, and served as pastors.

In their own history of Oak Grove Church of the Brethren, C.E. Eller was the organizer:

The <u>Oak Grove Church of the Brethren</u> congregation started its ministry in the Oak Grove community in 1902, as a Sunday School held in the Oak Grove School. The organizer of this ministry, C.E. Eller, donated much of the lumber, sawed from his timber, for the first meeting place built in 1908. Oak Grove was organized as a congregation in 1923, thus becoming independent from the mother congregation, <u>Peters Creek Church of the Brethren</u> which had begun north of Roanoke, VA before 1840.

Many of Jacob Eller's descendants were instrumental in the local (German Baptist) Brethren Church. <u>John W. Eller</u> and his sons C.E. Eller (<u>Christian Emory "Christ" Eller</u>) and <u>David Newton Eller</u> are mentioned at length in the book <u>A History of the Brethren in Virginia</u> by D.H. Zigler, published in 1908 (excerpts below). Note the inclusion of the names Brubaker, Wertz and Barnhart. Those last names also appear often in the family tree of the Jacob Eller line.

Brethren preached here soon after the settlement in Botetourt County.

Eld. C. E. Eller in giving a report of Peters Creek church says: "The number of members at present is one hundred and fifty. Beginning with our present ministry, I find that the following Brethren have had oversight of Peters Creek church: C. E. Eller, D. C. Naff, C. A. Williams, John B. Naff, John W. Eller, Moses E. Brubaker, Elias Brubaker, Christian Wertz, John Brubaker, John Eller, and Daniel Barnhart.



THE MISSIONARY WORK OF THE FIRST DISTRICT OF VIRGINIA.

[Eld. D. N. Eller, son of Eld. John W. Eller, was born November 16, 1862, near Salem, Roanoke County, Virginia. His early life was spent on his father's farm and he had the advantages afforded by the public schools of the county. At the age of eighteen, he began teaching school. In 1885, he entered Bridgewater College and graduated two years later in the English Course. Subsequent to this, he taught in the public school three years. In 1891, he entered Botetourt Normal College as instructor in English and Philosophy and became president of that institution three years later, which position he holds

at this writing. Pres. Eller was elected minister in 1888 and ordained to the eldership in 1904. He has been secretary of the District Mission Board since 1898.]

July 12th, 2023.



Judge Roy Bean

Born Sometime in the 1830's, Phantly Roy Bean would become one of the most famous and infamous characters of the Old West. His self title "The Law West of Pecos" was not to Be trifled with. Known as the "Hanging Judge," Judge Roy Bean would summarily sentence many to a quick hanging without the benefit of any trail. These "Court" sessions would be held in his own saloon where one could get a cold beer, shoot pool, buy a new hat or simply admire his pet bear. Judge Roy would later curiously name his saloon "The Jersey Lilly" for the famous British actress Lillie Langtry,

whom he would never meet. The name "Lily" was misspelled by an employed sign painted

who was paid in food and drink for his services. This sign has hung uncorrected to this day. During those years Judge Beans' reputation and legend would grow to the point where the distinction between fact and fiction was not clear.

Emilie Charlotte Le Breton, born in 1853 on the Isle of Jersey in Great Britain, married Edward Langtry at the age of 20. Lillie and her new husband left the Jersey Isle for more glamorous society life of London. Lillie was known for her beauty and would model for the famous artists of the day. Quickly rising through the social ranks, Lillie would become famous for her independent thinking and rejection of strict Victorian edict. Later known as the jersey lily, Langtry became an actress and admired by many important men such as Theodore Roosevelt, Oscar Wilde and Judge Roy Bean.

Lillie did eventually visit Langtry, Texas and the saloon where Judge Roy held court. Sadly, she arrived a year after his death.

A Brief History of Salem, Virginia

Salem's story—first explored by Europeans 64 years after Jamestown, settled in the 1700s, and developed as a town serving travelers along the Great Road westward in 1802—is unique to a specific locality, but it is also the history of a community within the context of state, national, and world events. The narrative Salem City has to tell is that of every American city touched by wars, economic upheavals, and civic challenges—as well as by a few healing, helping hands along the way. The way Salem and its residents faced the world in which they have found themselves over the years makes their history distinctive, and worth a closer look.

Contact with Europeans changed the Native Americans' lives drastically. In addition to introducing the native population to new technology, colonists also brought with them diseases such as smallpox and influenza which killed a significant number of Indians. Those who survived often joined other tribes to the north and south. Attacks by the neighboring Iroquois drove the Toteros and their allies, the Saponis, out of their villages. By the early 1700s, few Native American tribes remained in the region.

Skirmishes between settlers and Native Americans heightened during the last half of the 18th century. Fort Lewis, named in honor of Andrew Lewis, was constructed to the west of what became Salem in 1752 in order to protect area settlers. Andrew Lewis distinguished himself in the French and Indian War, serving under George Washington in 1754 at Fort Necessity.

Lewis later led Virginia troops against the Confederacy of Indian Nations in the Battle of Point Pleasant in 1774, which was a precursor to the Revolutionary War. During the Revolution, Lewis drove Lord Dunmore, the last British Governor, out of Virginia.

After the American Revolution, Salem began to make the transition from an insular settlement into an emerging town. In 1800, General Lewis's son William sold to his neighbor James Simpson a thirty-one-acre tract of land for \$100. At this time, fewer than twenty-five families inhabited the area between the Roanoke River and Fort Lewis Mountain, but Simpson subdivided the land he bought from William Lewis into purchasable lots on each side of the area's main roadway, and Salem became a town in 1802. Through the sale of those lots, Salem quickly grew into a prosperous community serving travelers as they headed west along the Great Road. In the first decades of the 1800s, local businesses included taverns, stables, blacksmith shops, wagon and buggy repair facilities, groceries, clothing stores, a horse racing track, and a canal navigation company.

With the impending creation of Roanoke County in 1838, Salem citizens saw the opportunity to benefit from becoming the Roanoke County seat. John McCauley, a resident of Salem who had served in the House of Delegates, was commissioned by the town to lobby the legislature in Richmond, and his efforts were successful. Three months after Salem obtained county seat

status, eighteen justices commissioned by Governor David Campbell gathered at Faris' Tavern (where Salem Presbyterian Church now stands) to set the governmental machinery in motion. Three days later, the County Court convened and swore in six lawyers to practice in the new territory.

In 1847, the Virginia Collegiate Institute (later renamed Roanoke College) moved from

Augusta County to Salem in a single wagon. The Lutheran school, drawn to the community due to its central location, soon grew into a thriving academy for young men. In fact, Roanoke was one of the few colleges in the south which operated throughout the Civil War, with a home guard troop of students drilling weekly on the campus lawn.



While hardships and losses during the Civil War were many, Salem managed to avoid complete devastation. Two Union attacks on the town resulted in the destruction of railroad lines, depots, barns, storehouses, horses, and supplies —but in relatively few deaths. Salem's most active engagement occurred on June 21, 1864 as retreating Federal forces under Major General David Hunter met up with Confederate cavalry under Brigadier General John McCausland at the Battle of Hanging Rock. Both sides suffered casualties: the North lost about 30 men (killed, wounded, and captured) and 10 pieces of artillery; the South lost a fraction of that amount.

The locally organized Salem Flying Artillery fought for the South in a number of battles during the Civil War, including Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Spotsylvania Court House and Cold Harbor. When the war ended with Lee's surrender at Appomattox, the Salem Flying Artillery is recorded as having fired the final Confederate shot.

Following the Civil War, Salem faced a period of great civic change. In addition to repairing streets and bridges after years of neglect, the town worked to establish free public schools for both white and black children. Electricity, a public waterworks, and telephone lines were all advancements which came to Salem in the 1870s and 1880s and helped boost growth through the next decade.

During World War I, Salem won national prominence as one of the few towns in the country in which every child owned at least one War Saving Stamp. Due to fuel shortages, churches suspended Sunday night services, but the mayor called on residents to pray silently at the sound of church and fire bells during a lights-off moment at nine o'clock each night. Before the praying stopped, 15 Salem men were killed in World War I.

After the War, Salem adopted a council-manager form of government—leading to an increased emphasis on the improvement of public works. Salem paved its streets with concrete in order to accommodate the increased automobile traffic through town. New business buildings, including Salem's first federal post office, appeared on Main Street. Older stores were renovated and decked out with modernized fronts. Lakeside Amusement Park opened its "concrete lake" swimming pool on the outskirts of town; rides and a roller coaster were added by 1923. The park was a favorite spot in the Roanoke Valley for over 60 years.

This burst of growth, however, was stunted by the Great Depression. Economic setbacks due to the stock market crash were felt as early as 1930 when Salem workers lost paychecks during a two-week shutdown of the Norfolk and Western railroad shops. Welfare recipients in Roanoke County increased from 263 families to 1,407 families in a matter of months. In response, a predecessor to the Chamber of Commerce was formed on a voluntary basis to seek new industries and stimulate trade. Its efforts, along with the arrival of the Veteran's Hospital, gave Salem's economy enough strength to pull itself out of the worst years of the depression and face the approaching challenges of World War II.

Of the hundreds sent into battle, 43 Salem men died in the war. Those who returned found a different hometown than the one they left. Salem's new wave of economic and municipal development carried the town and its citizens into the coming years.

With the annexation of South Salem in 1953 and an eastern tract in 1960, Salem was the state's largest "town" with a population of 16,058. On December 31, 1967, the Town of Salem officially became Salem City at midnight. Population: 22,500.

In the fifty years since its birth, Salem City has grown considerably, even as it maintains an old-fashioned, small-town community feel. The opening of the Salem Civic Center in 1967, Lewis-Gale Hospital in 1972, Salem High School in 1977, Salem Stadium in 1985, the Salem Museum in 1992, Memorial Stadium in 1995, and the Salem Visitor's Center in 1997—all have contributed to making Salem a thriving, progressive city.e region

Mother and Daughter Remembering

Marjorie Ree "Margie" Justice Murdock and Mona Murdock Rumsey

On September 21, 2022, I drove down to Toccoa, Georgia to meet Ms. Margie and her daughter Mona. Margie was born 1931 in Rabun County, Georgia. Margie's grandmother lived in Rabun County and her mother went there just to be with her when Margie was born. Her mother returned home several days later. Margie was the third child born to Fred Cole Justice and Della Leona Eller. She grew up on Upper Hightower, Towns County, Georgia with ten siblings. Both of her grandparents (Harve Penland Eller and Margaret Caroline Maney) were Eller Descendants going back to Susannah "Sukey" Eller through her son, Joseph. I received a warm welcome when I pulled into the driveway. We finished introductions and sat down in the living room. After a few minutes we began to chat about family.

Margie's earliest memory of her childhood was when the family was moving from one house on Upper Hightower to another one in the community. The family was using a sled and a wagon to move their belongings. She was trying to help and recalled dropping her mother's butter dish and breaking it. Her father was a logger and also owned a sugar cane mill. People would bring their cane to him so he could turn it into syrup. The family mule, Sallie was used to turn the mill. The mill was next to their barn where a creek ran close to it. The family's house was built with

logs and split boards and you could see the light of day creeping through them. *Della Leona Eller* One part of the roof was open to the outside weather and the wind would blow the snow into the house. Margie could remember waking up and snow being on the covers. Her mother would pile on the quilts till it was hard to turn over. All the time we were talking, I was watching Mona look at her mother and I could see the love that she had for her. At one time they were holding hands and I thought about how important family was and why God gave us family to help us through life.

Ms. Margie's father was a farmer, logger, cane mill owner, and also worked for the WPA. The Works Progress Administration was an ambitious employment and infrastructure program created by President Franklin Roosevelt in 1935, during the bleakest days of the Great Depression. This program put lots of Americans to work building schools, hospitals, roads and other public works. Margie recalled her dad having an old tin lunch pail that he carried to work. Every day when he came home all the kids would rush to see what might be left in the pail. Margie loved to ride the mule to the field. Her father would lift her up onto the mule and lead it to the field. When the day was over, she got to ride the mule home. She loved to stay home from school and go to the field with her father. Once she rubbed poison oak all over her arms and legs and waited for it to break her out. "Just my luck", she laughed...it didn't bother me a bit.

Margie was really close to her brother John and her sister, Mary. John was born in 1933 and Mary was born in 1932. Mary would get tickled and drop everything and laugh, flop her arms around and just shake. Margie would think of funny things to say just to watch her laugh. Later on her father

divided the room in the loft so that she and her sister Mary had their own room. They would get to laughing and her father would have to tell them to get quiet.

In her younger years, Ms. Margie went to school at Upper Hightower School. Mr. Bert Eller was her teacher for several years. The school was located just across the road from where Upper Hightower Church now sits. She went to high school in Hiawassee. She told me of a time when she had home economics in her last class of the day. The class had prepared food for the PTA meeting that night. Her teacher had left the room to go to the office. She opened the window and called the football players who were at practice over and gave them the food. Everyone hurried home after class and didn't hang around to see what happened. Mary would get notes from Margie's teachers to take home but she never gave them to their parents.

Ms Margie said "We were poor and blessed at the same time". She expressed her belief in an Almighty God and prays for Him to protect her and her family. As I got ready to leave, I asked her for a hug. I thanked her and Mona for their time and walked to my vehicle. I looked at my watch and could not believe that I had been there four hours. I love meeting good people, when they are family, it just makes the experience that much better.

Mona later noted: I am now officially a member of the DAR, (Daughters of the American Revolution). I am so grateful for all those that helped me!

Very Grateful most of all for the life and service of my 5th Great Grandfather, Martin Maney (B-1752)

who came from Ireland to find a new life here. He came over and served as an indentured servant to Colonel Fielding Lewis (George Washington's brother-in-law). Martin Maney registered for military service in 1776. Private Martin Maney was a true American patriot and a proud North Carolinian. He served under Captain James Knox in the Eighth Virginia Regiment of Foot. He fought in the Battles of White Plains, New York; Germantown, Pennsylvania; and Monmouth, New Jersey prior to being discharged at Valley Forge. Patriot Martin Maney and his Virginia Company were with Washington's Army at Valley Forge. Following his discharge, he enlisted with the North Carolina Militia where he became a personal body guard for General Sevier, later the first Governor of Tennessee, who was receiving death threats from the Tories.



He married Keziah Vann, daughter of John Joseph Vann on 15 September 1781, in Jonesborough, Washington, Tennessee, United States.

I am very proud and so humbled to be a descendant of Martin Maney 1752-1830.

Jacob Eller Cemetery - Macon County, TN

Jan and I were in Nashville this week (Dec 2022) for the Grand Ole Opry Christmas Show. While I was close, I wanted to visit the Jacob Eller Cemetery in Hillsdale, Tennessee. I had previously contacted some of Jacob's descendants.



They met us at Meadorville Missionary Baptist Church and we drove up to the cemetery. The cemetery was located on Taylor Branch Lane which goes past the old Jacob Eller homeplace, cemetery, and up into Eller Holler.



<u>Jacob Eller</u> was born in Asheville, Buncombe County, North Carolina in 1822. He moved to Hillsdale, Tennessee around 1850 and settled down.

He married <u>Nancy M. Wood</u> and they both are buried in the family cemetery.

Jacob was a millwright and a very industrious man. He built a dam across Goose Creek and built a roller mill and a grist mill.

He blasted rock for the dam from the cliffs above the creek.

His descendant (Rick Eller) has a copy of the grist mill ledger with names of folks who brought corn to the mill to be ground.

Jacob Eller designed and built a family cemetery. Rocks blasted from the cliffs were used to construct a fence all the way around the cemetery. In some of the wall pics, you can see the chisel marks in the rock.

He deeded the cemetery to his Eller family and explained right of way markers and who could be buried in the cemetery. His descendant (Steve Eller) has a copy of the deed and promised to make me a copy.






On The Lighter Side

- Don't take life seriously. Every genealogist knows nobody gets out alive.
- If at first you don't succeed, search, search again. That is why we call it re-search.





GEORGE MICHAEL ELLER, 1722–1778 AND DESCENDANTS OF HIS IN AMERICA

To The Families Of DAVID GALLAWAY ELLER AND JAMES MARION ELLER, JR., As Of 2012 Includes Information On The Related Families Of SCOTT, MARTIN, GALLAWAY, HARPER, BRYAN, STEWART.

James Hook printed the first work on the Eller genealogy in 1925 titled: James Hook and Virginia Eller. He printed the second edition on the Eller family after thirty-two years titled: George Michael Eller and Descendants of His in America. However, only a few copies of Hook's first two published works are still in existence.

According to tradition, the Eller ancestors were from the Palatinate of Germany, where Eller is the name of at least five villages. Eller means "dweller near the elder trees." The name was confirmed as being of German origin by its coat of arms, which was found in Reirstap's Armorial General P1 CCLXIII as well as by the will of George Michael Eller, written in German (1778) and recorded in Frederick County, Maryland. Strong evidence showing George Michael to the son of Georg Eller of Kaltenbrunn, Untermerzbach, Bavaria exists, showing George as the second son of the union of Georg and Margaretha Huels Eller.

Margaretha Eleonor Sallén began researching the Eller lineage in 1966 until her death in 1973 when it continued with David until completed and printed in late 2012. Each chapter focuses on nine generations of these figureheads: George Michael Eller, James Scott, John Martin, Sr., William Gallaway, Robert Harper, Sr., William Smith Bryan, and John R. Stewart.
